League of Women Voters Opening Statement

I'm Lisa Radigan. I was appointed to be the Ward 2 representative in February of this year. First of all, I want to thank the League of Women Voters for inviting us all here tonight. I had planned to discuss my background as a lawyer and Chief Compliance Officer, all of the ways in which I have been striving to make a positive impact on our community since I was appointed, and how I believe I can make an even bigger impact with a full term.

Instead, I want to take my relatively brief time in this opening statement share what I cherish about public service and what it means to me to be a part of a community. Every one of the candidates here tonight is here because they believe we are privileged to live in Hudson and believe that they can work to make it even better. We may disagree on what projects to prioritize or the best way to make improvements, but I have to believe that we all agree the most important thing is continuing to make Hudson a great place to live. We are all part of this community. We shop at the same stores. Our kids go to the same schools, the same playgrounds. We drive on the same roads and walk on the same sidewalks. We live in the same neighborhoods. It's OK to disagree. It's OK to say, I think I have a better idea.

But we need to do that constructively. What I value about local public service, and the reason I decided to be involved in council in the first place, is the ability to connect with people and make a positive impact on the community. I've talked to people on front porches and in coffee shops, in parks and in living rooms. Consistently, what I hear is how happy they are to live in a community like Hudson. One that is proud of its past and wants to preserve it, but also one that is focused on the future. These shared values are why we moved here. It's why we're raising our family here. It's why we're staying here.

I want to be involved in continuing to make this city a great place to live, work, and raise a family. I will continue to come to every decision and every meeting ready to listen and discuss ideas. I don't presume to have all the answers or the only way forward, but I promise that I will continue to serve my community with an open mind and an open heart.
